We honored Alexia Retallack and Beth Taylor, members leaving the Board. Their service to our branch has been steady and remarkable.



What are you doing with your time and talents? Where do you invest your energy and your savings?

From time to time, usually around New Year's or my birthday, I take stock of what I'm doing with my life. What is working, and what is not working?

Have you felt like this? What do you stand for? What puts meaning in your life?

When I reflect on what I'm doing, AAUW always pops out as one of the most meaningful. Not only do we provide scholarships for college students and STEM camps for middle schoolers, AAUW is astonishingly successful in legislative advocacy for women, girls, and families.

Let's take a moment for a quick review of our mission and values, as stated in our national website . . .

OUR MISSION Gender Equity & Economic Security

We've led the fight for fair pay and economic opportunity for women — and the battle continues: Women still get just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man, and men continue to dominate the top roles and highest-paying professions.

OUR VALUES Intersectional. Inclusive. Intergenerational. Empowering.

Though we are nonpartisan, we are not values-neutral: We fight to remove the barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles. And we advocate for federal, state and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination.

OUR THREE-PRONG FOCUS:

Economic Security

We've been working to narrow the gender pay gap, which greets women as soon as they enter the workforce and widens throughout their working lives. Unequal wages stand in the way of a woman's ability to pay off student debt, build wealth, and save for a secure retirement.

Key Public Policy/Community Dates for June 2021

June 6 On this historic day in 1944, Allied Troops invaded the beaches of Normandy, France. It is the largest amphibious assault in world history. This massive, bloody battle was the turning point of World War II in the European theater.

June 14 Flag Day

June 19 Juneteenth celebrates and symbolizes the end of slavery in the United States. President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on September 22, 1862, but it was not until June 19, 1865 that all slaves were finally freed. That concluding event was when General Fordon Graner rode into Galveston, Texas with his troops and issued Order Number 3, which finally freed the last of the slaves. The formal end of slavery was marked by the passing of the 13th Amendment of the Constitution.

Approval of minutes Rachel Kanowsky

Revisions were suggested for the March meeting minutes. A motion was made to approve the minutes with the corrections.

Motions: 1St Colleen, 2nd Norma - Unanimously passed.

Treasurer's report Caryl Daly/Jan Winters

Showing total gross dues vs. that we get to keep \$20 per membership.

Donations are coming into TT, scholarships, and general fund. However, caution: we have no income currently.

Brandee inquired about the frequency of notification to the Scholarship committee regarding donations to scholarship. When they get that information, Diane Fishburn sends thank you notes.

MINUTES FROM MARCH BOARD MEETING (Con't)

Discussion was around running an information line in the newsletter thanking people for donations. Do we want a graphic showing progress toward a goal - e.g., a beaker for Tech Trek. Do we show quarterly? We should say thank you to people donating but leave out the dollar amount.

We have a huge commitment of scholarships with no fund raiser. Should we do a fundraising campaign? Brandee has volunteered to take the lead on a campaign to raise money April-June for scholarships. Is it a month long, email, social media campaign? Right now, we are seeing some donations with membership renewal.

Brandee feels that we should keep fundraising separate from membership renewal – "go straight to the chase". Jan raised the question, "how do we get the donation?" Colleen suggested that during the campaign, we could ask family members and friends to donate to AAUW.

Brandee will craft the campaign, including highlighting scholarship recipients. Start at the 4-22 general meeting and introduce the scholarship recipients, which will kick-off the campaign. Sandra will generate the Zoom information and send it to Brandee. Jan suggested that the scholarship girls make a short video, and we send to membership and put on social media. High school scholarships in April and community college in May.

Tech Trek Beth Taylor

Seven girls will go to TT virtual camp this year. They are all the 2020 girls. One final parent permission came into our PO Box. It will cost about \$400 per girl for the virtual camp. California is looking at how to make the program better for the future. Opportunities for input will be on the California website. We got \$2,076 in donations for this year.
