

## A COLLEGE EDUCATION MADE A DIFFERENCE IN MY LIFE SANDRA NIEMI SCOTT

In my senior year of high school, I knew I wanted to go to college. However, my father refused to pay for tuition saying, "Why do you need to go to college? You're just going to get married". Additionally, my parents refused to let me apply for a student loan – and as a minor I needed their permission.

I was on the honor roll and in the National Honor Society. Hoping I could win a scholar-ship, I asked my high school counselor about applying. He told me that my father, as a civil engineer, likely had an income that would disqualify me. I had one option left: get a job to pay tuition and cover expenses.

I did get a job – actually two jobs. I graduated with a B.A. in history in 1971. I did get married and divorced and married again and divorced again. When the second marriage ended, I found myself a single mother - who had been out of the job market for a few years - with a three-year-old son and a mortgage.

After working in a low-paying job at a fabric store for a few months, I decided to go back to school to pursue a degree in Textile Science. I found a part-time job as a secretary at the University of Minnesota to pay tuition and support myself and my son. This time, I was fortunate that my aunt and sister subsidized my income so I could complete my B.S.

I was encouraged by faculty in my department to pursue an MA degree as well, which I earned in 1987. During that time, I worked as a Reference Library Assistant at the University of Minnesota and then secured a graduate Research Assistant position. Both jobs required me to be in graduate school.

Toward the end of my studies, I worked for Industrial Fabrics Association International as an Information Specialist and Editor of the Journal of Industrial Textiles, a job for which my education qualified me. My degrees also were required for positions at Delta College in Stockton and at Sierra College. The minimum qualification to be a

community college Educational Administrator is a master's degree.

The point in telling my story is that life rarely takes you on a straight path - and the more you are educationally prepared the better the outcome. All my professional jobs were predicated on the fact that I had college degrees. Moreover, my education taught me to be a critical thinker and problem solver.

I was fortunate that tuition was low as compared to now; part-time work covered tuition. Tuition at the University of Minnesota, where I went to college, has increased over 4,000% since 1966. Comparatively, the inflation rate is 800%. Today it would be impossible to cover costs working part-time without a grant, loan and/or scholarships.

I know that a college education was a major factor in my long-term economic security. I contribute to our scholarship fund, because we, as AAUW Auburn, make a difference in women's lives through scholarships.


So the June meeting will be Tuesday, May 31 at 5 P.M. on Zoom. It is our last board meeting until we start up again in September.

#### I'M ONLY ONE VOTE, SO WHY BOTHER?

As I write this, we are still wrapping our heads around the fact that the United States has suffered yet another mass shooting.

This one was at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, TX, where 19 fourth-graders were murdered. In addition, two teachers were killed, and at least 11 students were injured. An unknowable but massive number of others will suffer mental trauma for the rest of their lives.

That such a thing has happened is not surprising. In fact, this is the 248th mass shooting in the U.S. this year, the 49th in May, and the 13th in the past week. Of the mass shootings in May, 27 many of them were at schools. Is it any wonder that many children are afraid to go to school?

Joe Biden made a profound and passionate statement about the shooting, ending with the question, "When in God's name are we going to stand up to the gun lobby? Why are we willing to live with this carnage?"

Despite the "thoughts and prayers" of many politicians, and the efforts of some people to pass common-sense gun laws, we all know that nothing will be done. Because of the filibuster tradition in the Senate, we need 60 votes to pass legislation that is supported by the vast majority of American citizens. The filibuster -- which is not included in the Constitution -- has evolved from a concept that would protect minority rule into a brick wall

that thwarts the will of the majority. Some politicians would literally rather save the concept of the filibuster than the lives of our children.

It was nearly ten years ago that a deranged man shot and killed 20 children and six adults at the Sandy Hill Elementary School. Connecticut Senator Chris Murphy has been a valiant and outspoken supporter of common-sense gun laws. He made an impromptu and impassioned speech when news of the latest tragedy was announced:

"Spare me the bullshit about mental illness. We don't have any more mental illness than any other country in the world. You cannot explain this through a prism of mental illness, because we don't—we're not an outlier on mental illness. We're an outlier when it comes to access to firearms and the ability of criminals and very sick people to get their hands on firearms. That's what makes America different."

You have one vote, so you need to use it. When each one of us votes our conscience and demands that gun laws be changed, we can make a difference. It will be the difference between life and death. Tell your friends.

## FOLLOW-UP TO LOBBY WEEK ARTICLE FROM MAY NEWSLETTER

AAUW members have expressed their concerns about the current state of public policy in our nation.

The predominant themes that emerged were the inadequate state of child and elder care, Title IX protections for campus sexual assault survivors and transgender youth, and the erosion of protection of women's reproductive health rights.

As it turns out, the three top priority bills that our members talked about during Lobby Wee ) April 11-15 were AB 92 (Childcare), AB 1968 (Campus Sexual Assault), and AB 1666 (Abortion Protection).

Speaking of Title IX, the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the enactment of this critical legislation will be June 23. We urge you to visit the Public Policy webpage on the AAUW California website, under **Issues We Care About/Title IX**.



Many people will be surprised to see that they are in a quite different district now, compared to what they have come to know over the past ten years.


The California Primary Election, to choose the top two contenders in each district (regardless of party affiliation), will take place on Tuesday, June 7. The National Election Day is Tuesday, November 8.

In each AAUW newsletter between now and the election, we will highlight a different office and list the top candidates for that office.

#### Joe Patterson


