VOTER REGISTRATION NEWS

A number of our AAUW members who deliver voter registration cards to sites throughout Placer County attended a ribbon cutting ceremony at the new Clerk-Recorder-Elections office in Rocklin on August 10th.

Our AAUW members have been delivering voter registration forms to post offices, DMV's, libraries and other sites in Placer County since 1991. At that time the County offered non-profits the opportunity to provide this service as a fundraising opportunity. The first Purchase Agreement was signed by then president, Pam Hart for \$1250. In 1996, Auburn's 4H club was awarded the contract but the following year it returned to AAUW.

Deanna Hogg was the AAUW president and VRC Chair in1997 and set up the system for our card delivery service which we still follow today. When she left Auburn in 2000, I assumed chairpersonship.

In 1999, we "got a raise!'—from \$1250 to \$1300. The next increase was in 2000 for \$1500. In 2006, we were encouraged by an Election Dept official to apply for a CPI adjustment which then granted us \$1600.

In some years we were told to remove all of the old cards from the sites and replace them with the newly printed State forms which showed the required new legal verbiage. All of the old cards we had delivered needed to be destroyed. That was a big job!

This year's forms will display the new address of the Elections Dept. in Rocklin, so we will be delivering new cards again with the new address. However, Ryan Ronco, County Registrar, reported that the Elections Dept. will maintain an office site in Auburn.

Since I have decided to "retire" from the chairpersonship of the VRC Volunteers, I am very grateful to Barbara Gerletti-Weiss for agreeing to accept that responsibility. She is a long-time VRC Deliverer and an excellent reporter of the data required by the County. I will continue to be part of our volunteer group and deliver the VRC cards to my designated sites in Auburn.

NOVEMBER 1948: University Women Organize, 49 Meet at Placer College.

Lois Nelson called for a meeting to organize a local chapter of AAUW in Auburn, CA.

APRIL 1949: Auburn Becomes The 66th Branch in California.

"Things were changing now that the war was over. We weren't counting coupons and rolling bandages anymore. We were focused on promoting education for young girls and women - and continuing our own education." Gina Akers, Charter member

OCTOBER 1949: Branch Awards First Scholarship Joy Johnson, Placer College sophomore, first scholarship recipient, receives \$50.

If they have a full schedule and achieved a 3.0 average in their first year of college, we send them a renewal award of an additional \$500. This continues our investment in them and encourages them to carry on, knowing that we are proud of them and are rooting for them.

Chloe is at University of Hawaii at Manoa. "During my first year of college I have been working hard towards my marine biology degree. Although the STEM classes have been challenging, the courses only grew my excitement for my future career!"

Megan is at Cal Poly and is loving her major in Psychology with a minor in Biology. She is a research assistant in the psychology department as well as working as a surgical assistant for a cosmetic surgeon. She seems to be taking full advantage of the "hands on learning" environment at Cal Poly.

Amaya is at UCSB and she said, "Upon arrival, I never imagined how much work college would be, but I am immersing myself into the culture and trying my best! The chemistry series at UCSB is a weeder series and I and my classmates spend 4 to 6hours a day studying just chemistry."

Emily is at UC Davis and she said, "I have been involved in some exciting research in the field of astrophysics with Professor Wittman at UCD. We've been working on determining the redshift of galaxy cluster ChampangeD to explore potential dark matter interactions. It's been an incredible experience, and I collected spectroscopic data using Keck telescopes and collaborated with UCD professors and grad students. We are working to publish a paper on that work soon."
