AUBURN AAUW TECH TREK CAMP SEASON 2025 UPDATE.

We already have 2 Dorm monitors signed up for Tech Trek Davis Camp and 9 other volunteers assisting in various ways on the Auburn AAUW Tech Trek Committee. Auburn area 7th grade Math and Science school teachers sent us 21 camper nominations at the end of January, double the number of nominees we had last year. Thank you to our Auburn members who volunteered to be Auburn Tech Trek Ambassadors. Each Auburn Ambassador visited teachers at a few of the 13 Auburn area schools, building relationships with the Math and Science teachers with conversation and cookies. Auburn AAUW Board approved our branch to sponsor 10 campers this year. Half of the Auburn selected campers will go to UC Davis and half will attend camp at UC Santa Cruz. Local area girl nominees and their parents are currently filling out and submitting their TT Camp applications and will be considered for interviews in March and final selected campers will be notified in late March.

GREAT DECISIONS DISCUSSION GROUP INVITES YOU!

First, a bit of history . . .

In 1918, in an effort to support President Woodrow Wilson's efforts to achieve lasting peace, 141 U.S. citizens organized the league of Free Nations Association, later to become the Foreign Policy Association (1923) and its Great Decisions program. Their mission then, as now, was to study all sides of global issues and become more educated Americans. Among the founders was Eleanor Roosevelt.

In 1938, nineteen women established a program called "Off-the-Record," whose purpose was to actively inform people of international and national affairs. This group continues to meet today in New York, but now has a membership of over 600. Other programs spawned by the FPA include *The World Today* (1940) on the radio and later on NBC television and the World Affairs Council (1986). The Emmy Award-winning *Great Decisions Television Series* began that same year and ran until 2021. The FPA is currently reviving the program.

Great Decisions started (1954) as a way for everyday citizens to get together and discuss global policies. Today, Great Decisions has other avenues of learning as well: school curriculi, a master class on DVD, and speaker programs as well as their trademark briefing book. In addition, the FPA sends out and tabulates an annual opinion ballot based on the book's topics and presents these results to the White House, the Departments of State and Defense, members of Congress, and the media each year.

People of consequence have routinely addressed the Foreign Policy Association: Margaret Thatcher, Indira Ghandi, Hosni Mubarek, and Bill Clinton – to name just a few.

So, what do we do in a Great Decisions meeting? We talk! And talk! The in-depth briefing book contains eight topics of global importance, with an emphasis on background and current policies. And while the goal here is to understand the issues, it is sometimes hard to keep politics out of the discussion. But each opinion adds to the



body intellect, and everyone is treated with respect.

INVITATION FROM THE PLACER COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Placer County Historical Society invites the members, family and friends of Auburn AAUW to a celebration of Gussie Wright Stewart, the first woman attorney in Placer County. The event will be held at the Auburn City Hall where an exhibit of Gussie's life and accomplishments has recently been installed.

March 12, 2025 5:30 – 7:30 pm Auburn City Hall, 2nd Floor

Gussie passed the Bar in 1915 and practiced law through the 1940's in Placer County most notably out of her offices in the White House across the street from the Auburn Courthouse. A commemorative tile was recently installed in Auburn Central Square calling her "A Woman of Firsts." Gussie was a fierce advocate for women and children both in the courtroom and the community. She had a long and varied career as an attorney handling all types of cases. She was clearly esteemed by her colleagues and was elected the first woman President of the County Bar Association in 1940. She was also known for her public speeches made on topics such as "Equal Rights for Women" and "Laws for Women." Gussie's husband James Stewart is also featured in the exhibit. He was a noted mining engineer from Gold Run, and he fully supported Gussie in her advocacy and career. According to newspaper accounts, they opened their home to several women needing a safe haven as well as caring for 19 foster children over the years.

The exhibit will continue through the end of April, and is available for viewing on weekdays and on Saturday, March 8th.

Diane Fishburn, an Auburn AAUW member, County Museum docent and Historical Society volunteer, has been part of the team researching Gussie Stewart's life, and arranging for the exhibit and the March 12th celebration.
